1. "Why are you working so hard at the moment?"

a. "Because <u>I'll buy</u> a car, so I'm saving as much money as I can."
b. "Because <u>I'm going to buy</u> a car, so I'm saving as much money as I can."

- 2. a. "*I'm flying* to Brazil tomorrow. My plane leaves at 2pm."
 - b. "*I'm going to fly* to Brazil tomorrow. My plane leaves at 2pm."
- 3. a. "*What will you buy* Eddie for his birthday?"
 - b. "*What are you going to buy* Eddie for his birthday?"

Answer: "a CD."

"But he hasn't got a CD player!"

- a. "OK then. *I'll buy* him a bottle of whisky instead."
- b. "OK then. *I'm going to buy* him a bottle of whisky instead."
- 4. "Dad, can you sew on a button for me?"
- a. "Sorry, son. I can't sew. Ask Mum, <u>she'll do</u> it for you."
- b. "Sorry, son. I can't sew. Ask Mum, <u>she's going to</u> it for you."
- 5. "Why have you bought so many eggs?"
- a. "Because *I'm going to make* omelettes for tea."
- b. "Because <u>I'll make</u> omelettes for tea."
- 6. "Can you help me with these reports?
- a. "Sorry, *I'm going to meet* the boss at 11am and I can't be late."
- b. "Sorry, *I'm meeting* the boss at 11am and I can't be late."

7. a. "What <u>will you do</u> today?"

b. "What *are you going to do* today?"

a. "It's Sarah's birthday tomorrow, so *<u>I'm going to bake</u>* a cake for her."

b. "It's Sarah's birthday tomorrow, so *I'll bake* a cake for her."

8. "I have an appointment with the bank manager tomorrow."

a. "Why <u>will you see</u> her?"

b. "Why *are you going to see* her?"

a. "Because *my wife and I will start* our own business and we need some money."

b. "Because *my wife and I are going to start* our own business and we need some money."

9. "Sorry, Eddie. I didn't do the homework because I don't have the course book."

a. That's OK. <u>I'll make</u> you some photocopies this time, but next week <u>you'll have to buy</u> the book.

b. That's OK. *I'm going to make* you some photocopies, but next week *you're going to have to buy* the book.

10. "Shall I tell her that I love her?"

a. "Where's a coin? If it's heads <u>I'll tell</u> her, if it's tails <u>I won't</u>."

b. "Where's a coin? If it's heads <u>I'm going to tell</u> her, if it's tails <u>I'm not going to</u>."
